Why Upholstered Bed Frames Vary So Much in Price

A frame built from solid timber with a properly reinforced slat base will always cost more to produce than one built from lightweight MDF or thin ply, but it will also last considerably longer and support more weight without flexing. Foam density works the same way higher density foam costs more upfront but resists the sagging, flattened look that cheap foam develops within a year or two of regular use. Fabric is the most visible cost driver, entry level polyester weaves are inexpensive to produce, while genuine velvets, boucles and

performance grade fabrics cost significantly more per metre, and that difference shows up directly in the final price.

Entry Level Upholstered Bed Frames What to Expect

At the lower end of the UK market, roughly £200–£350 for a Double, you are generally looking at frames built from lighter materials with a thinner foam layer and a basic polyester or linen blend fabric. Mid Range Upholstered Bed Frames Where Most UK Buyers Land

At this price point, you typically get a solid timber or reinforced frame, medium to high density foam, and a wider choice of proper fabric options including linen blends and entry level velvets. Premium frames also tend to come with better warranties and more robust internal frame construction, which matters if you are planning to keep the bed for a decade or more rather than replacing it every few years. Value for Money What Actually Matters Long Term

sagging foam or worn fabric may end up costing more over a decade than a £550 frame built to last eight to ten years. Foam density is the single best predictor of long term comfort retention, while fabric choice affects how the frame looks after years of daily contact. If durability and appearance over time matter to you, it's worth prioritising build quality over any single design feature. Where It's Worth Spending More and Where It Is not

Fabric grade is worth spending a little more on if you plan to keep the frame long term, since higher grade weaves resist wear and fading noticeably better. Where you can often save without much downside is on elaborate design detailing purely for aesthetics; a simpler silhouette in a good quality fabric will typically outlast a heavily detailed frame built with cheaper foam and construction underneath. Seasonal Sales and Timing Your Purchase

UK furniture pricing does fluctuate seasonally, and timing a purchase around key sale periods in January, late summer bank holiday weekends, and Black Friday in particular can meaningfully reduce the cost of a mid-range or premium upholstered frame. It's worth being cautious of artificially inflated prices around these periods, so comparing a frame price history where possible, or simply checking it against the full bed frame range at a non-sale time, can help you judge whether a discount is genuine.
