Safety Beats Style—Every Time

Attractive design cannot compensate for unsafe construction. Before evaluating any crib's finish or aesthetic, confirm it meets current U.S. federal safety requirements as outlined by the Consumer Product Safety Commission.

Buy New

All new cribs sold in the U.S. must meet federal CPSC standards. Mattress supports must be durable, slats must be high-quality and break-resistant, and side-rail spacing must meet specific measurements.

Avoid Vintage or Secondhand

Skip hand-me-downs and antique cribs unless you can verify the exact model, condition, all original hardware, and current regulatory compliance. When in doubt, pass.

Solid Wood Is Only Valuable When Construction Is Strong

The wood species is only part of the story. Evaluate the entire structure before purchasing.



Frame & Rails

Look for a rigid frame, smooth rails, and no wobble, gaps, exposed screws, or sharp edges.

Joints & Fasteners

Inspect every joint and fastener—finish inconsistencies or loose hardware are red flags.

CPSC 2011 Standards

Regulations took effect June 28, 2011: stronger mattress supports, more durable hardware, rigorous safety testing, and a full ban on traditional drop-side cribs.

Measure the Entrapment Hazards Before You Buy

Physical dimensions are non-negotiable safety criteria. Use a tape measure and soda can before committing to any model.

Slat Spacing

No more than **2 3/8 inches**—roughly the width of a soda can. Zero cracked or missing slats permitted. A baby's body must not be able to fit through.

Headboard & Footboard

Avoid any decorative cutouts. Ornamental openings can trap a baby's head, limb, or clothing with dangerous consequences.

Corner Posts

Corner posts must not project more than **1/16 inch** above the top rail. Taller posts can snag infant clothing and create a strangulation risk.

A Firm, Snug Mattress Is Part of the Crib System

The Fit Rule

The mattress must be **firm, flat, and tight-fitting**. If you can fit two fingers between the mattress edge and the crib side, the fit is too loose—a baby can become trapped in that gap.

Height Adjustment

Choose a crib with multiple mattress height positions. Keep the support high for a newborn, then lower it before your child can sit or stand independently.

Keep the Sleep Space Bare

Use only a fitted crib sheet. **Never** add bumpers, pillows, quilts, stuffed toys, or other soft bedding—these are suffocation hazards.



Finish and Materials Matter—But Labels Need Context



Disclosed Finishes

Prioritize cribs with clearly disclosed wood content and finishes tested for lead and chemical emissions.



GREENGUARD Gold

A useful screen for low chemical emissions. FSC certification addresses responsible forestry—not crib safety itself.



True Solid Wood?

Ask whether the crib is 100% solid wood or combines wood with plywood, MDF, veneers, or plastic. Mixed materials affect long-term durability and repairability.



Convertibility Pays Only If the Future Parts Exist

A 3-in-1 or 4-in-1 crib can grow with your child—but only if the manufacturer still supports it when you need it.

1

Verify What's Included

Confirm exactly which conversion kit comes in the box and which accessories cost extra before purchase.

2

Check Long-Term Support

Review the warranty, replacement-hardware policy, assembly instructions, and current parts availability.

Real-World Example

Babyletto's Scoot 3-in-1 lists 100% solid New Zealand Pine, an **included** toddler-bed conversion kit, GREENGUARD Gold, and FSC certification—at \$599.



Assembly Quality Can Make or Break a Safe Crib



Incorrect assembly is among the leading causes of crib-related infant injuries. Infants can become trapped or strangled when gaps are created by loose, broken, or missing hardware or slats.

01

Follow Clear Instructions

Choose cribs with illustrated, step-by-step guides and foolproof hardware that cannot be installed incorrectly or left loose.

02

Test After Assembly

Check for wobble, retighten every fastener, and confirm the mattress support locks firmly into position.

03

Reinspect Periodically

Keep the manual. Loose, broken, or missing hardware creates entrapment and suffocation hazards that develop over time.

The Five-Minute Buy-or-Pass Checklist

Before finalizing any crib purchase, run through all five steps. If any step fails, pass.

1

Compliance & Recalls

Confirm current federal CPSC compliance and check the specific model for open recalls at [cpsc.gov](https://www.cpsc.gov).

2

Physical Inspection

Measure slat spacing ($\leq 2 \frac{3}{8}$ in.), inspect corner posts ($\leq 1/16$ in. projection), check for cutouts, and examine all rails, joints, and finish.

3

Mattress Fit & Heights

Test the mattress fit—no two-finger gap. Review all available height-adjustment positions for newborn through standing stages.

4

Total Ownership Cost

Price the full package: crib, mattress, conversion kits, shipping, and replacement parts over the product's lifetime.

5

Safe Sleep Setup

Prepare a bare, firm sleep space. Baby on their back, in their own crib, without soft bedding—to reduce SIDS and suffocation risk for infants under 12 months.
