

What are the Ashtasiddhis of Ganesh Ji: Meaning and Religious Significance



Ganesha is worshipped as the god who removes obstacles and a sign of wisdom, wealth, and good fortune. In the Hindu spiritual belief system, Ganesha is also related to the Siddhi, which means the attainment of spiritual success or any special power gained spiritually.

What does Ashtasiddhi Mean?

Ashtasiddhi is formed by two Sanskrit words, which are "Ashta," which means eight, and "Siddhi," which means accomplishment, spiritual attainment or extraordinary power. There are eight siddhis in the classical context, which include Anima, Mahima, Garima, Laghima, Prapti, Prakamya, Ishitva, and Vashitva. Various Hindu sources provide different names for these powers. It should be noted that there are other meanings of these powers besides physical abilities.

The Eight Ashtasiddhis and Their Meanings



1. Anima

"Anima" is traditionally described as the ability to reduce to a very tiny size, for example, an atom. Symbolically, it can represent humility and a microscopic perspective on everything.

2. Mahima

Mahima is traditionally described as the ability to expand into enormous proportions. Symbolically, it can represent greatness and enlightenment.

3. Garima

"Garima" is traditionally described as the ability to increase weight to a great extent.

4. Laghima

Laghima is traditionally described as the ability to be very light or weightless. From a spiritual perspective, it has to do with being free of the excessiveness of the body and burdensome attachments.

5. Prapti

"Prapti" is said to mean the ability to attain whatever one wants. In terms of spirituality, it means the accomplishment of something through concentration and dedication.

6. Prakamya

Prakamya means fulfilling your intentions or desires. It is traditionally associated with the willpower to pursue the chosen goal.

7. Ishitva

Ishitva is connected to lordship, mastery, and control in traditional terms. Symbolically, its meaning is linked to self-mastery rather than control over other people.

8. Vashitva

Vashitva is the term that indicates the capacity for control or dominance. Spiritually speaking, it could mean being in charge of one's senses and actions.

The eight siddhis have been defined in various ways within Hinduism and yoga, and not always with identical interpretations. Traditional texts also point out that the powers are of secondary importance when compared to spiritual enlightenment.

Religious Significance of Ashtasiddhi

Ganesha is linked to the eight siddhis because of his portrayal in general terms as a god associated with knowledge, achievement, and favorable new beginnings. According to Hindu mythology, the Ashtasiddhis are also shown to be attendants of Ganesha.

Ganesha in the Shiv Parivaar

Lord Ganesha is also considered a part of the Shiv Parivaar that consists of Lord Shiva and Goddess Parvati, as well as their sons, Lord Ganesha and Lord Kartikeya. The [Shiv Parivar marble statue](#) is

thus the personification of this divine family and can be displayed in temples, home temples, and other devotional spaces. The portrayal of the Shiv Parivaar is very important for the devotees, as it is a symbol of many qualities of the holy family in one artwork.
